Dear Friends of Timmy Global Health,

For the last 17 years, we've valued and relied on the startup culture of our organization. The Timmy network has always been an all-hands-on deck, roll-up-your-sleeves community—and by doing small things with great love, we've achieved a lot of good.

But in 2013-14, things started to look a little different. We sent 34 medical service teams abroad, funded 2,001 patient referrals, and donated \$3.8 million worth of medicines and supplies to local and international partners. We were able to give more than 14,700 people access to quality healthcare. And for the first time in our history, we began to feel like we weren't a startup anymore.

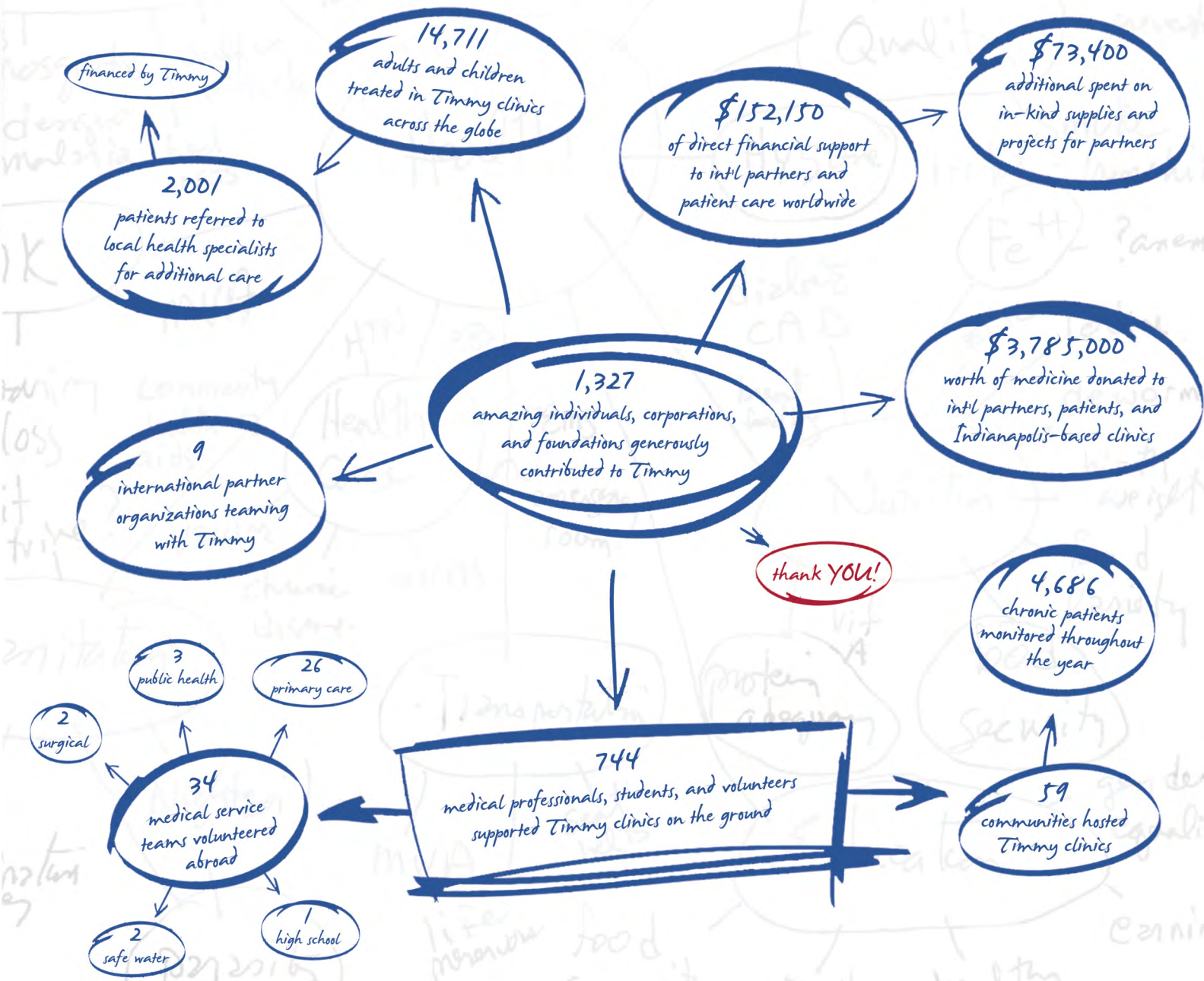

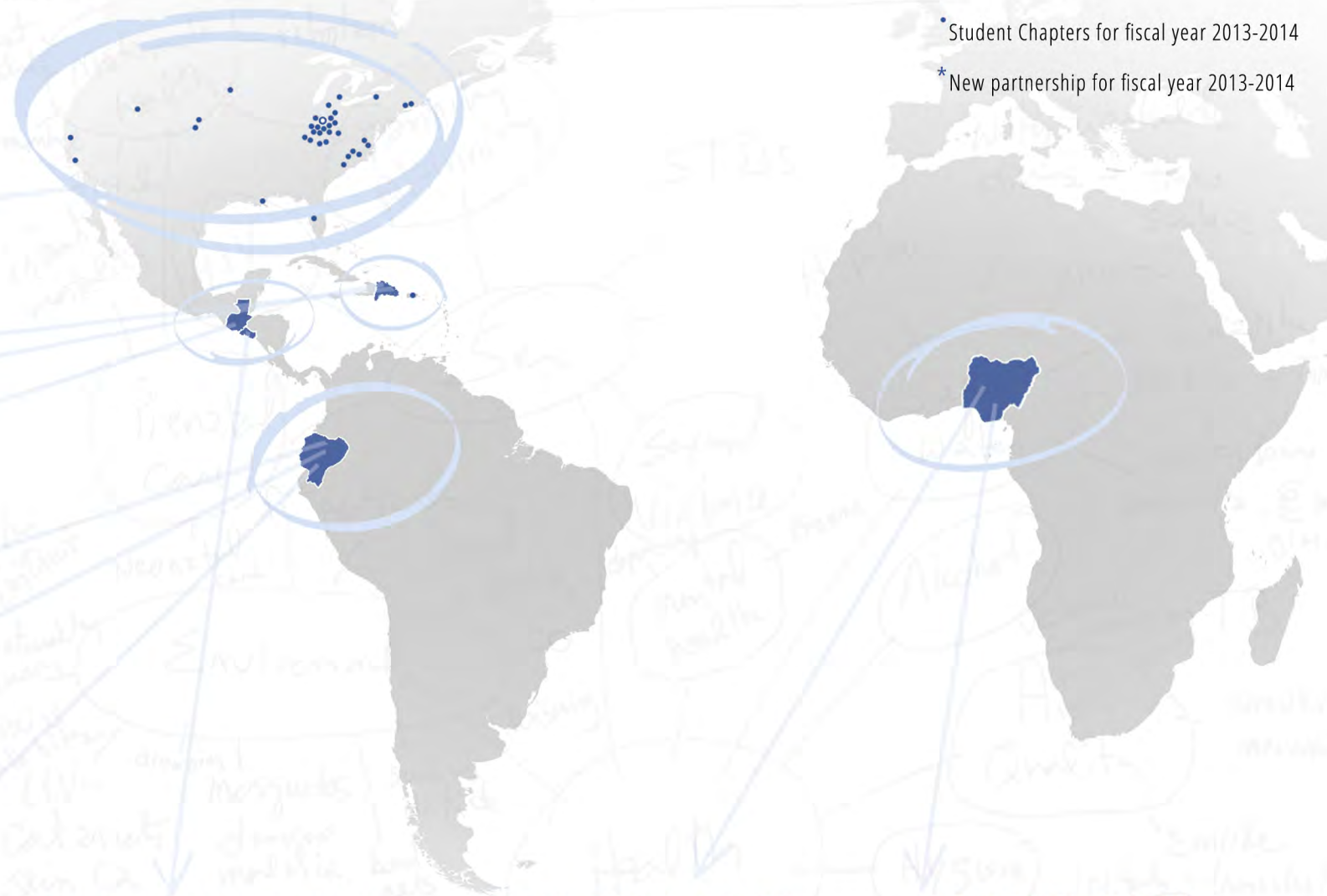
Our local partners are the international organizations and front-line health workers that help us provide Timmy patients with year-round access to quality care.

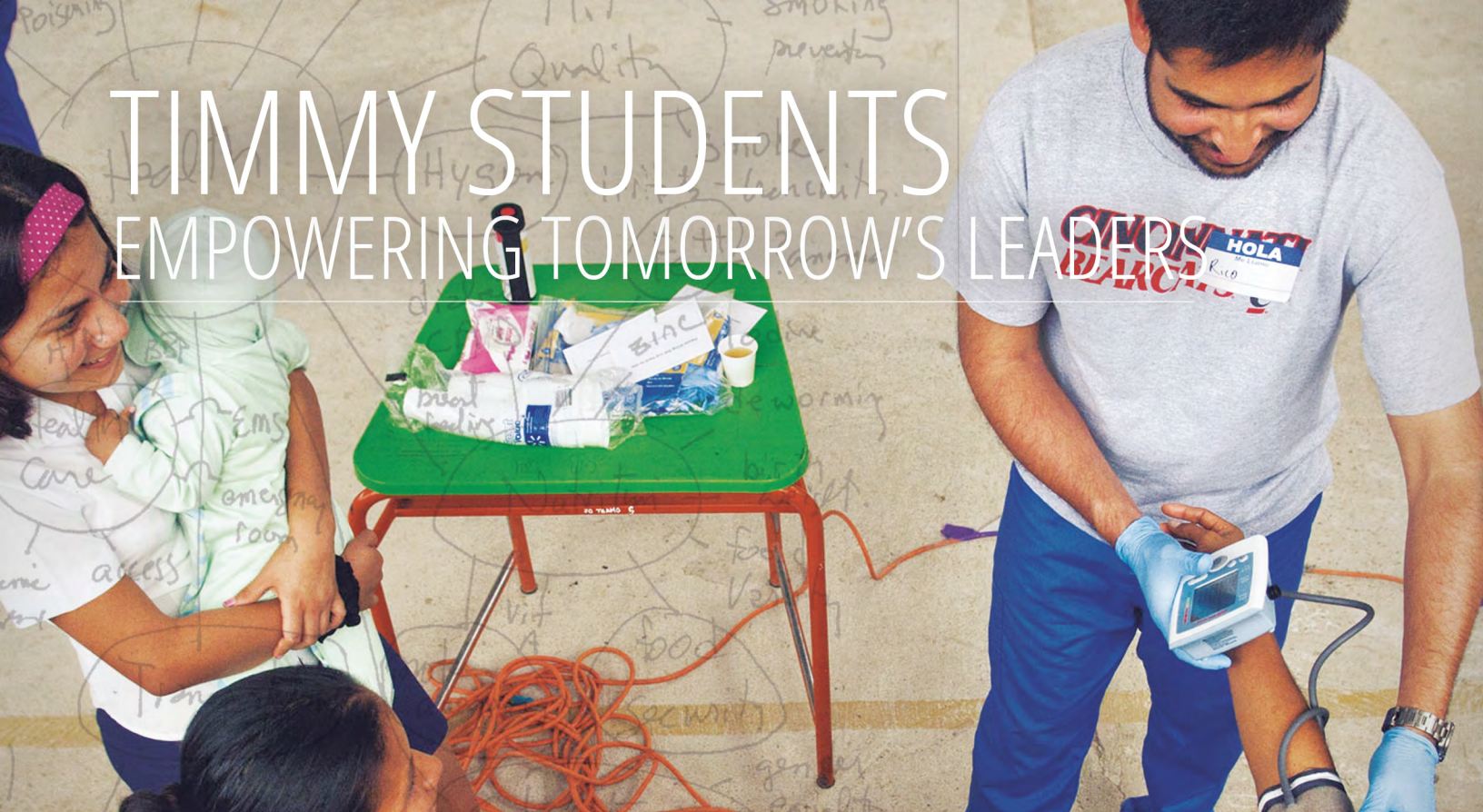

TIMMY STUDENTS EMPOWERING TOMORROW'S LEADERS



SMALL BEGINNINGS: ENHANCING THEIR EXPERIENCE

We believe Timmy Students are uniquely positioned to fight health disparities. Since day one, we've been committed to finding new ways to support their efforts—and last year we invested more resources in our students than ever before. We welcomed 113 students from 30 universities to Indianapolis for our annual Student Leadership Conference to develop practical skills and think critically about global health challenges. We launched a new online Chapter Resource Center and assigned staff liaisons to offer more support to students throughout the year. In addition to the hand-on experiences of our medical service trips, we offered students new safe water and surgical trip opportunities. And we disbursed \$13,200 via our Hank Benjamin Memorial Scholarship Program to help fund volunteer projects and student-led health initiatives at home and abroad.

BIG IMPACT: WHAT DO SERVICE TRIPS DO FOR STUDENTS?

Our student programming feedback speaks for itself. We've surveyed, and the results are in. As a result of participating on our medical service trips:

- 55% of students are inspired to pursue careers that address health disparities
- 94% of students say they intend to incorporate global health into their professions
- 93% of students are motivated to continue volunteering in programs that address global health challenges
- 35% INCREASE** of students' understanding of how factors like political context and literacy affect access to quality healthcare

- ▶ **LOCAL SERVICE PARTICIPATION** such as working in free clinics, tutoring underserved students, and hosting community cleanups
- ▶ **SERVICE TRIP TRAVEL** where they gain valuable hands-on experiences while helping to provide quality care to underserved patients
- ▶ **FUNDRAISING FOR PROGRAMS** by hosting banquets, 5Ks, letter-writing campaigns, and date auctions to raise support for Timmy communities
- ▶ **SUPPLY PROCUREMENT** such as trick-or-treating for vitamins, hosting oral health supply drives, and engaging their fellow students
- ▶ **GLOBAL HEALTH ADVOCACY** by taking time outside of their regular coursework to educate themselves and their peers about global health issues
- ▶ **MED PROF RECRUITMENT** by connecting us with family members and building relationships with healthcare providers from their communities

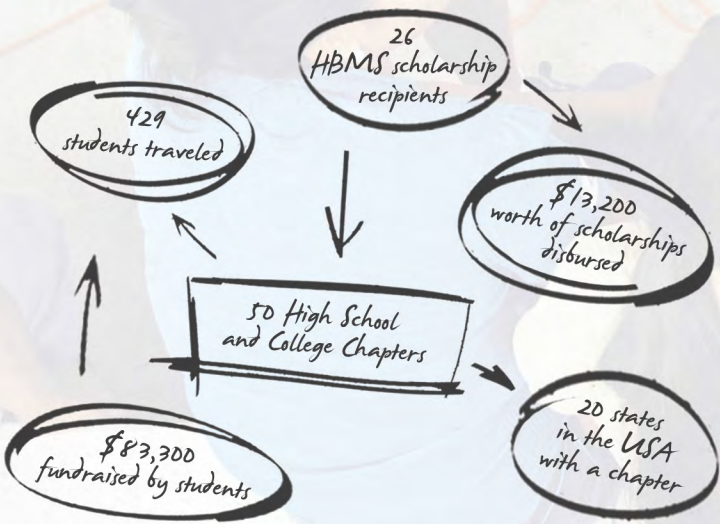

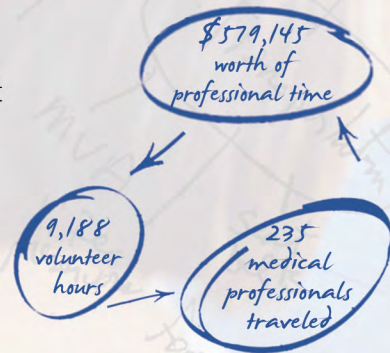


MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS

VALUING OUR VOLUNTEERS

SMALL BEGINNINGS: EXPANDING OUR OUTREACH

We think it goes without saying that our medical volunteers—the amazing physicians, nurses, and pharmacists that travel on our medical service trips—make our work possible. Last year, they took valuable time away from their careers to work in resource-limited settings. They helped strengthen our international partnerships by donating important human resources. They increased local capacity by working alongside native healthcare providers. And they engaged our student volunteers in important conversations about global health and careers in medicine.



- ⊙ Develop an elective procedures policy for safe and effective conduct in our clinics
- ⊙ Determine the roles and responsibilities of medical team leaders on each trip
- ⊙ Standardize medical emergency protocols and supplies
- ⊙ Create responsible guidelines for vitamin distribution
- ⊙ Implement Needle-Stick and Sharps-Use policies to increase safety in clinic

BIG IMPACT

In 2013-14, a team of medical volunteers went above and beyond their commitment to our programs to form the Medical Advisory Committee (MAC). The MAC provides guidance and vision on ways to improve our service provision. This committee—comprised of 16 medical professionals from across the US—meets virtually each month to evaluate Timmy's medical policies and procedures. In the last year, they've helped us:

A NEW MODEL OF SERVICE PROVISION

SMALL BEGINNINGS: NOT JUST A START-UP

Over the years, we've determined that Timmy is strongest, and our patient outcomes are best, when our programming complements the efforts of our partners, strengthens local health systems, and builds the infrastructure to treat vulnerable patients. Through Timmy 2.0—a program model we launched in the last year—we're putting a new focus on the essential program areas that we believe best strengthen our service provision.

BIG IMPACT

The Timmy 2.0 framework emphasizes:



STRONG LOCAL PARTNER ORGANIZATIONS

By investing in our international partners, we can help vulnerable communities gain access to consistent health and social service programs.



DATA DRIVEN DECISIONS FROM TIMMYCARE E.M.R.

We gather data from our patients and communities to determine the efficiency and effectiveness of our work, and make public health decisions based on facts.



ROBUST PATIENT REFERRAL SYSTEM

Through our referral partners we guarantee patients with advanced conditions have access to the complete care they need.



LOCAL MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS

We value in-country health providers that bridge cultural gaps and help ensure continuity of care in between our medical trips.



TRAINED COMMUNITY HEALTH PROMOTERS

We empower members of our communities to manage follow-up care and deliver preventative health education to our patients.



TRANSITION STRATEGY

We focus on strengthening local capacity so that we can someday transition out of our communities without losing continuity or quality of care.



STANDARDIZED MEDICAL SERVICE TRIPS

By focusing on high quality trips, we develop credibility and trust in our communities, while providing efficient and effective services.





MIDWIFE TRAINING & NUTRITION

ENHANCED CARE FROM THE START



SMALL BEGINNINGS: IMPROVING MATERNAL & CHILD HEALTH

Working with Pop-Wuj and the Guatemalan Ministry of Health, we put a new focus on maternal and child health in 2013-14. Through our Midwife Training project, we worked to reduce infant mortality and expand health education in rural areas. And through our Nutrition Program, we helped to alleviate the effects of malnutrition in our Timmy communities.

BIG IMPACT

In the first year of our Nutrition Program, we enrolled 75 children between the ages of 6 and 24 months. We worked with mothers to track their growth, and provided education about healthy stages of cognitive development. More than 30,000 packets of Nutributter & Plumpynut—nutritional supplements that provide calories and nutrients to children suffering from malnutrition—were distributed. We also worked with the Ministry of Health to train 310 midwives in new

techniques for infant resuscitation. Midwives attend a majority of births in Guatemala, and these trainings helped to strengthen their knowledge for responding to complications. The trainings also helped to bridge some important gaps between traditional and modern medicine. Each midwife participated in hands-on, dynamic training and evaluation sessions, received a birthing kit, and learned about new tools to effectively resuscitate infants.

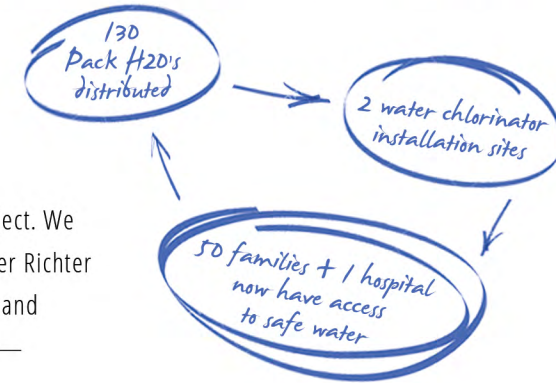

SAFE WATER & WASH TRAINING

DEEPENING OUR IMPACT

SMALL BEGINNINGS: SAFE WATER FOR TIMMY COMMUNITIES

Last year, we launched a new evidence-based public health initiative—our Safe Water Solutions project. We partnered with Louisville-based organization MedWater to install water chlorination systems at Stadler Richter Hospital and in the Timmy community of Los Rios. Combined with educational programs about water and sanitation hygiene, we made a new commitment to bringing safe, potable water to the Amazon Basin—a region where many Timmy patients suffer from ongoing water and sanitation related illnesses.



BIG IMPACT

We launched this project with the hopes of:

- ▶ Improving access to safe water sources in Timmy communities
- ▶ Improving Timmy's ability to address waterborne diseases
- ▶ Empowering Timmy community members to make healthy decisions to utilize safe water for themselves and their families

To qualify for the project, our pilot communities are responsible for developing Community Water Councils (CWC). The CWC's provide ongoing management of the chlorinator, routine water tests, supervision of the water distribution via portable Pack H2O's, and WASH (water and sanitation hygiene) trainings at local schools and community centers. In this way, communities not only gain access to safe water, but also learn about preventative health measures for properly using, treating, and storing water.

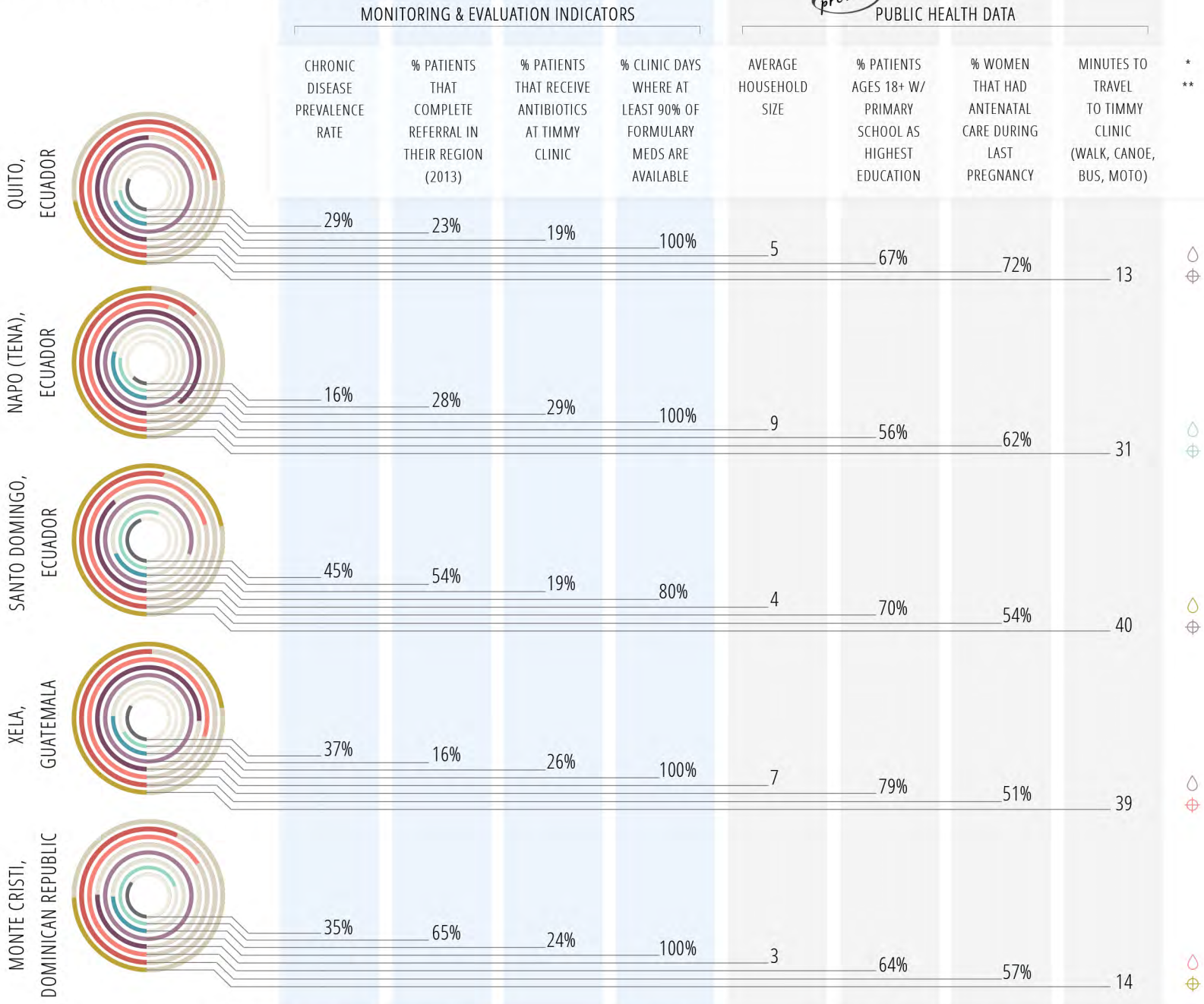

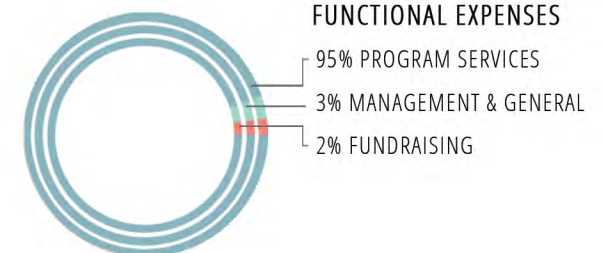
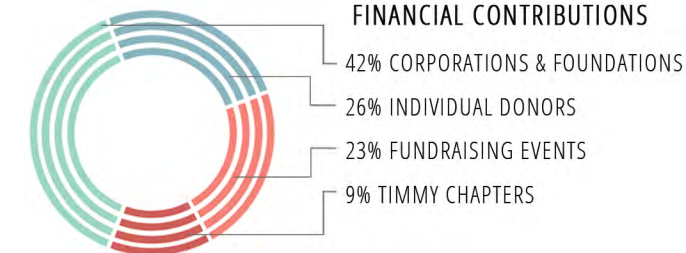


*PRIMARY DRINKING WATER SOURCE:
